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Reading is at the heart of the curriculum.

In EYFS and Y1, considerable time is given over to the teaching of systematic phonics through whole-class direct teaching; small group guided sessions and a wide variety of spoken language and play activities. We are well resourced with a range of engaging, fully decodable phonics sets and enrichment books to add further interest and variety to your child's reading experience.

- share stories and pictures watch your child's response
- talk, listen, ask questions and build concentration
- make 'me' time! Turn off the telly and find a quiet place to snuggle up together with a book

How do we teach phonics at Nova Primary?





What is it?

- Phonics letter sounds
- Fast paced



 Teaches children to put sounds together to read words and split sounds up to spell words and solution



Letter sounds

- Pure sounds
- Each sound has a picture card
- Rhyme for writing letters formation, including pre-cursive





Blending

Putting sounds together to make a word – reading

c a t = cat

- Children need to practise this by saying sounds out loud
- Playing active games



Segmenting

- Opposite of blending. Finding letter sounds to spell
- Slow the word down & emphasise sounds so children can hear all the sounds ready to write them.
- Spelling on fingers before writing.

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Terms

- Segmenting: splitting sounds to spell
- Blending: putting sounds together to read
- Phoneme: a spoken sound
- Grapheme: a written sound
- **Digraph:** two letters to make one sound e.g. sh, ch
- Trigraph: three letters that make one sound e.g. igh
- Quadgraph: four letters that make one sound e.g tion
- Split digraph: A sound split by another letter e.g i-e
- CVC word: consonant vowel consonant word e.g mum, cat



Sound wallets

- Help children to learn their sounds by
- -Playing games
- -Making words
- -Copying sounds
- When the children know the sounds they can move them over to 'sounds I know' and use them to make words.
- These will be updated weekly as we learn new sounds



Word wallets

- There are some words that can't be sounded out the, come, said etc.
- Children need to recognise these words in order to be a confident reader and they will struggle to make progress without knowing them.
- We will send home 4 or 5 words at a time
- Once children know most words in their wallet we will put more in



What you can do

- Make it fun! Children love playing games with sounds
- Read their reading books everyday
- Blending at home get me the p e n
- Practising tricky words
- Spotting words and letters when out e.g. license plates, food labels in shops.
