

LO: To introduce our new line of enquiry.  This term, in Line of Enquiry, we are answering the question 'Why should we care about the environment?'. Include the following features:

- Fronted adverbials
- Exclamation marks



A fronted adverbial always starts at the front of a sentence and tells the reader where, why or how something happened.  LO: To write the build-up of your story using noun phrases  Continue your story by writing the build-up (introduce the problem your character will face). Look at the pictures that lead up to your characters' problem.  Remember, you are not actually writing the problem yet.  Use the following features:  - Noun phrase - Question mark - Capital letters and full stops  Parents: This is the section children usually find the most difficult. LO: To research deforestation and its effects  One of the biggest threats to the rainforest is deforestation.  Why are we cutting trees down at such an alarming rate?  What is the impact to the environment?  Create an information poster answering these questions. Add anything you find interesting to this as well.  Deforestation happens all over the world, however try to focus your research to the Amazon Rainforest.
5	Continue your story by writing the climax of your story (the exciting bit where your character solves the problem). Look at the pictures on your story map where the 'exciting bit' or 'turning point' is. Use these to help you out. Use the following features:  - Subordinating conjunctions - Speech (don't forget your speech sandwich) - Capital letters and full stops  Once you've finished, try editing your work. Look out for capital letter and punctuation errors and use your success criteria to ensure you have included all your features.  Capital letters and full stops are an absolute must (you may have noticed I included it in each section's success criteria)!  Now they are finished make sure you email them in to school. We'd all love to see them!  If you can't remember your speech sandwich, have a look at this video to remind you.
