YEAR 1


Year 1 have been getting into the festive spirit this term and have had fun decorating their classrooms.

We have been learning how to use adjectives in our writing and have kept the theme of Christmas, by writing descriptive sentences about Edgar the Dragon.



Year 2 were very excited to hold their Great Exhibition at the end of term where they showcased the models of Victorian inventions which they researched and designed in their D&T lessons. They designed models of bathing machines and pinhole cameras and were very excited to showcase their learning to each other as well as perform a song, "Playtimes Past", which they have been learning this half term.







Year 3 children have had a very busy end to term 2. In English, they felt inspired by the story of Amisi and the Fig and wrote their own journey/ quest narrative. Thank you for supporting your child in internalising the story map through drama at home.

In Line of Enquiry, the Year 3 children visited the Bristol Museum and Art Gallery and attended an Ancient Egypt workshop to answer their questions about the past. They were fascinated to see a sarcophagus and to handle other primary sources including jewellery and papyrus.






Year 4 have been finishing their line of enquiry 'What did the Romans do for us and what was their legacy on Britain?' by being designers and engineers.

at Nova Primary School for healthy wellbeing

At Nova we recognise the importance of promoting positive mental health and emotional wellbeing to our students and their families. Over Term 1 and 2 we have been implementing the Zones of Regulation curriculum – a curriculum based around the use of four colours to help children self-identify how they are feeling.

This term each class have been getting creative to express their understanding of the different zones and the different feelings encompassed by each zone.

ZONES OF REGULATION EXHIBITION

Year 1

SSGB made paper faces focusing on different emotions they were currently feeling or reflecting on a time when they may have been experiencing that emotion.



Concorde made paintings expressing how they could reach the Green Zone through being calm and mindful.

Rolls Royce painted trees for each zone, using fingerprints as leaves, writing words relating to each zone.





Year 3

Vincent and Goram made plant pot people to explain how the four different Zones may feel and look.








Year 4

Year 4 used lots of different colour shades to collage the different Zones' colours, using words to describe the different Zones also.



Year 6

Morph used oil pastels to display their unique interpretations of the different zones. **Banksy** used their acting skills to make facial expressions for different emotions across the four zones.



CAN CORNER - PHYSICAL AND/OR SENSORY NEEDS

Having discussed the three other broad areas of need within SEN, this now brings us to the fourth and final area – Physical and/or Sensory. Children with a Physical and/or Sensory need may have a visual impairment, a hearing impairment, sensory processing difficulties, developmental co-ordination difficulties (dyspraxia) or may have a congenital condition which has an impact on their physical and sensory abilities.

Sensory Processing Disorder (SPD)

SPD is a commonly debated disorder as to whether it is a separate need, or whether it is the result of observable symptoms linked to well-established conditions such as Autism. If you are interested in knowing more about this condition, you may be

General Sensory Needs

Many children can display sensory needs. This does not necessarily signal that the child has an underlying condition such as Autism, it may just be the way they like things: they dislike the sun shining on them, they like their socks and shoes to be a certain way, they prefer a particular light in their bedroom, they don't like certain foods. You may find this website useful in providing some strategies linked to the 5

Visual and Hearing Impairments

Children with visual or hearing impairments will require certain bespoke support both at home and in school depending on their level of need: hearing aids, visual support, braille support, Makaton or sign language. It is likely that you will be aware of your child's visual and hearing impairments due to regular visits and check-ups with the opticians and audiologists. It is really important that you ensure your child has a regular eye and hearing test during their early development and as they continue to grow to ensure any needs are identified early. If you need advice on where to go for this, please contact the school office and ask to speak to the SENCo.

Developmental Co-ordination Difficulties (DCD)

DCD or Dyspraxia is a common disorder affecting many children and adults – did you know that Daniel Radcliffe (Harry Potter) and Jamie Oliver have DCD? Every child or adult with DCD will have strengths and needs that are bespoke to them as individuals. If you are concerned that you have observed concerns with your child's

fine or gross motor skills, please reach out to their class teacher in the first instance to begin observations into whether this is the case. Occupational Therapists can support the identification of DCD and identify strategies that can support children at home and in school to develop some of their skills but to also identify ways of managing difficulties. What do I need to do to apply for a school place?
