#### YEAR GROUP NEWS

## **EYFS**

This Term in Reception our Topic is 'Amazing Animals'! The children have turned the role-play area into a vet's and have been enjoying helping the different animals. For our Talk for Writing lessons, we have been reading the story 'Owl Babies'. We have been learning all about owls and other nocturnal animals. We built nests, went hunting for feathers, learnt about the life cycle of owls, created story maps and made up our own stories. Soon we will also have some special feathery visitors! The children have been working very hard on their reading, we are super proud of the progress they are making. Thank you to parents for your continued support in reading at home. ## YEAR 1

Year 1 have hit the ground running into 2022! We excitedly investigated a disturbance in our outside space and found some broken down houses belonging to The Three Little Pigs. We have been immersed in the story and now know it by heart. Our next step is innovating the story to create our own versions and we are working on describing our new characters with adjectives.

The children immensely enjoyed being artists for an Art Day as we learnt all about portraits. We explored a range of portraits by artists such as Freda Kahlo, Andy Warhol and Kehinde Wiley; describing what we liked about them and what we found

interesting. We expanded our understanding of shape by studying our faces in the mirror, and developed our art skills in drawing line and adding tone to our portraits.







# Year 2

Year 2 have been busy being musicians and geographers! In music, we have been composing music to represent a calm and stormy sea and in Geography, we have begun to map out the playground as part of our local surroundings.







Year 3

Year 3 have kicked off the New Year exploring what it means to be a Scientist in our

new Line of Enquiry: How can Science Educate and Entertain us? We have been using our scientific enquiry skills to make hypotheses and conclusions about how different electrical items work. We have even discovered that our bodies contain a small amount of electricity and can act as a human circuit!

In English, we are learning how to write portal stories and will soon be innovating our own version of *Elf Road*. We are also reading The Wild Robot by Peter Brown which has taught us that we should treat everybody fairly no matter who they are, where they come from or what they look like.

In Maths, we are busy practising our times tables and are getting very good at them! Remember to practise on Times Tables Rock Stars in order to win the class battle!

Finally, to wind things down a little, we are practising Mindful Movements in PE to help connect our bodies to our breathing.

What a busy but brilliant term we have ahead of us!











#### Year 4


## Year 5

the children studying primary resources (pottery) from the time, before using our printing skills to create our own orange and black Greek 'key' designs.









# Year 6
